



14 and 21 Days Kimberley Tour Itinerary

The Kimberley Tour is not running in 2011. Check with us for dates of the 2012 tour.

Day one: Depart Alice Springs. If joining us here, then please arrive Tuesday afternoon ready for a Wednesday morning departure. Camp tonight at the Granites. Bare bones camp no facilities. Today we travel the once notorious Tanami track. The South-eastern end of this road while still gravel is much improved from the rugged track that it was. Still it is remote area travel and precautions need to be taken. We detour from the Tanami road to Mt Doreen, location of historic grazing and mining operations. There is plenty to explore. Our camp tonight, while a real bush camp is in a little known area, close-by the road. We would usually have the camp to ourselves. Sit by the fire and watching the sunset from our camp on the side of a small hill.

Day two: Camp Lake Gregory. Continuing our journey up the Tanami track, the road now gets rougher. We detour onto an even less used road to Lake Gregory. This section of the trip is on aboriginal land, once inaccessible to tourist. We camp by the lake.

Day three: Today we connect up with the northern end of the Canning Stock Route at Bililuna, before travelling along the last section of the Tanami road to Halls Creek. Along the way we detour to Wolfe Creek meteorite crater and climb up onto the rim of this massive impact crater. We camp nearby Old Halls Creek. Bare bones camp. No facilities.

Day Four: Today we head for one of the major highlights of the trip, Purnululu National Park. Over the next two days, we explore two of the amazing gorges amongst the bee-hive like mountains of the Bungle Bungle range. If you wish, you can take a flight over the Bungles in a helicopter (costs not included- typically \$160 pp). Our camp is in the National Park. Drop toilets, water for showers

Day Five: Purnululu National Park. Drop toilets, water for showers

Day Six: From Purnululu, we travel north then east for a short way to Kunanurra. Fuelled up, we then head for a campsite along the Ord River. Fishing in the Ord is usually fantastic so bring your rod and lures. Bare bones camp. No facilities.

Day Seven: Today we travel some little used historical tracks to Wyndham, then we travel west again, exploring some aboriginal rock art sites and the historical prison tree, before camping on the King River. Bare bones camp. No facilities.

Day Eight: Our track today is at first a little rugged but improves and becomes bulldust as we travel north and west, close to the Pentecost River before heading south to connect up with the Gibb River Road. Once on the road, we double back a little to explore a rock art site with one of the most amazing paintings of Wanjinias in the entire Kimberley. Our camp site is at the famous El Questro. We prefer to get away from the hordes and bush camp along the river but there are nearby showers and toilets, bar, restaurant. If you wish to live the high life, you may stay in alternate accommodation (costs not included).

Day Nine: El Questro. Today we explore more of El Questro's stunning scenery.

Day Ten: We can have early start this morning to explore a little more around El Questro before heading west along the Gibb River road then north towards Kalumburu. Today we get to see some amazing Bradshaw art tucked away not far from the road. Our camp is on Drysdale River station at the quieter of the two camping areas known as Miner's Pool. The camp has drop toilets, and sufficient water for showers. Swimming in the pool is refreshing and exciting as well, as there are freshwater crocodiles in the pool. The fishing is excellent, and we will show you the tricks needed to catch the somewhat shy and elusive Sooty Grunter.

Day Eleven: Our drive today is one of the most spectacular in the country. We drive for kilometres through an ancient forest of Livistonia palms to our camp site on the Mitchell Plateau nearby the Mitchell falls. Drop toilets, no facilities.

Day Twelve: The walk into Mitchell falls is spellbinding. See aboriginal art tucked away in nooks and crannies along the way. Swim in the upper reaches above the falls, and witness the spectacular falls themselves. The best way to return to camp is via helicopter, and we would encourage you to take this option. We are usually able to negotiate a discounted price, and expect the flight to cost about \$60 per person. Mitchell Plateau. Bare bones camp. No facilities

Day Thirteen. Weather, sandflies and travel time permitting, we will camp on the ocean at Port Warrender on the rugged and almost inaccessible Admiralty Gulf. The journey there is over some of the more rugged trails in the region. The last eight kilometres takes one hour to travel. Bare bones camp. No facilities, except a spectacular blue ocean and fantastic fishing.

Day Fourteen. Today we leave the Mitchell Plateau and return to Drysdale River Station Homestead, We have the option of camping at Miner's Pool again or if you prefer we can camp at the homestead where there are hot showers, and flush toilets. Store. Petrol, Diesel, LPG.

Day Fifteen. On the Gibb River Road, for a while we then detour south to Old Mornington Station. Capture the spectacular gorges at sunset or just watch the wildlife at this conservation reserve. Showers, toilets, store, petrol, diesel, LPG

Day Sixteen. Old Mornington. Showers, toilets.

Day Seventeen. We travel back to the Gibb River road today. Our campsite depends on how well we travel. We camp somewhere on the Gibb River Road.

Day Eighteen. As we come to the end of our Gibb River road travels, we save the best for last. Winjanna Gorge and the ancient Devonian reef is astounding, and the freshwater crocodiles sunning themselves on the banks within two metres of the walking track is exciting, but Tunnel Creek is the highlight for many people. At tunnel creek, we walk 750 metres underground, in places up to our knees in cool water. The stalactites hanging from the roof give the tunnel a cathedral like atmosphere. Our camp is at a fantastic facility at Fitzroy Crossing. Full facilities, showers, toilets, store, pub, and restaurant

Day Nineteen. A long drive on the Great Northern Highway takes us back to the beginning of our Kimberley experience at Halls Creek, where we detour east along the Buntine Highway to the area around Wave Hill Station, made famous by the 1966 aboriginal walk off that began the land rights debate. Our camp is near Kalkarinji. Bare bones camp. No facilities. Our camp is on top of a jump-up (mesa)- surely our most spectacular campsite.

Day Twenty. Tennent Creek. Full facilities

Day Twenty-one. Alice Springs. Full facilities.

The schedule above is guide to where you can expect to go within the time allowed. With an off-road adventure such as this in difficult terrain, you should allow at least 2 extra days. The outback is terribly unkind to schedules, so be prepared to be flexible with timing and allow sufficient time for the trip to run over by as much as two days in changing circumstances. After a week you will forget what a schedule is anyway, and that is the beauty of such tours. Itineraries may change for safety or reasons of weather or other unforeseen events. We reserve the right to change the itinerary as required.

KIMBERLEY TOUR

The Kimberley region of Australia is not only a four-wheel drivers paradise, it is an incredible location brimming with adventure, spectacular scenery and incredible fishing. Your tour will not only take you to the famous places such as El Questro, but will explore some of the lesser-used tracks as well. Witness stunning aboriginal art, like nowhere else in Australia, including the amazing Bradshaw art. See ancient Devonian coral reefs, the amazing Bungle Bungles and walk along a creek for almost a kilometre underground.

We know you will really enjoy this trip, as it presents unique vistas and opportunities. It is however a remote trip in some of the most rugged country on our continent, so we need to ensure the highest level of safety possible for all participants.

Information for Tour Participants.

- **Please make sure you register for a trip** by completing the attached trip sheet. Full payment must be received at the very latest 21 days prior to the trip. Our payment and cancellation policy is attached.
- **Complete and sign the trip sheet** and return to us with your deposit payment to hold your place on the tour.
- **Maintain vehicle in a roadworthy condition.** Due to poor vehicle preparation in the past, by some participants, your vehicle will need to have been inspected by us or by a reputable 4WD specialist, prior to the trip, (hire vehicles are exempt) so that if there are any problems, they can be fixed prior to departure. If you use a 4WD specialist then, you will need to present proof that your vehicle was inspected. Please contact us as soon as you can to arrange an inspection.
- Tyres must have suitable tread for the conditions anticipated. 70% tread is recommended, at least all-terrain tyres (A/T), If you have light truck (LT) tyres fitted, all the better, as these handle rough terrain better than passenger tyres. Good tyres are critical on this tour as the Gibb River road is notoriously hard on tyres.
- Ensure that the vehicle has **front and rear recovery points** fitted and rated to at least 4000kg. In addition, you are to **carry your own snatch strap**. If you have “Bow” shackles rated for 3.25 tonne, then please bring them along. If you don’t have such shackles don’t worry, we carry sufficient.
- It is recommended that you also carry a suitable fire extinguisher or a large squeeze bottle filled with water. Spinifex under vehicles can cause fires.
- Provide adequate personal supplies of fuel, food and water for the trip, relevant vehicle equipment and spares or as advised by us.
- While on the trip, follow the directions of the Trip Leader at all times.
- Leaving or departing from the trip and/or convoy is only with Trip Leader’s knowledge and agreement. Due to the expense of organising remote area trips, there will be no refunds should you pull out mid-trip.
- Where warranted, any incidents are to be reported to the Trip Leader who will provide details in the incident report form.
- Should your vehicle break down, we will do all that we can without jeopardising other participants, to ensure we recover your vehicle. In certain rare situations, this may require the use of third parties. We cannot be responsible for any costs incurred for third parties to recover your vehicle, if we are unable to do so ourselves. We will do everything we can to avoid having to use third parties.
- In an emergency situation the trip leader needs to know if there are any resources he can utilise. If you have any of the following experience or qualifications, please make it known to the trip leader
 - Off road 4WD experience
 - First Aid Certificate or medical qualifications
 - Bush Mechanic skills (basic fault finding)
 - HF Radio experience

All participants are reminded that:

- we endeavour to ensure a high level of safety for all participants
- there are many factors and unforeseen circumstances that we have no control over, such as weather conditions.
- you are responsible for your vehicle and the persons in that vehicle and you are expected to demonstrate a duty of care to all road users, members of the public, and trip participants.
- convoy procedures, codes of ethics are provided for the safety and enjoyment of everyone on a trip/event
- participation on trip is conditional upon participants accepting the convoy procedures, codes of ethics and by-laws thus accepting liability for own actions at all times.
- Travel on the OTL requires traversing deep water. Depending on your vehicle, the depth of the water, weather and other factors, we can give no guarantee that we can travel the OTL. The tour leader reserves the right to change the route if necessary to protect participants and vehicles.

11. Lodge trip details with a responsible person, and ensure that person's details are recorded on the trip sheet.

CONVOY PROCEDURES AND RULES

1. Observe the road rules at all times.
2. Each vehicle is **responsible for the vehicle behind**.
3. A vehicle must **wait at each intersection** until the vehicle behind can observe the next direction of the route.
4. The convoy will only travel at the speed of the slowest vehicle in the convoy.
5. Should a vehicle become separated from the convoy, that vehicle will stop and wait for someone to return.
6. No vehicle shall pass the trip leader unless instructed to do so.
7. Each driver shall keep a **safe distance behind the vehicle in front** at all times especially in hilly country or after water crossings when brakes are wet or when dust prevents good vision.
8. **Allow the vehicle in front to get up or down steep slopes** or obstacles before following.
9. Whilst travelling in convoy, **on the highway or in heavy dust, headlights shall be switched on**.
10. In the event of an incident on a trip all non-essential vehicles and personnel will clear the immediate area, to allow easier access for appropriate action to be taken.
11. With larger convoys, each tour participant may be asked to act as "tail-end Charlie" on a rotating basis. The role of tail-end Charlie is to communicate to the trip leader the status of the convoy. The **vehicle behind the trip leader will open gates**, pull over to the side of the road to allow the rest of the convoy through, shut the gate as found, then rejoin the convoy at the rear in front of tail-end Charlie. With small convoys the trip leader may open and close all gates.
12. All **drivers are responsible for their passengers** at all times.
13. No firearms will be permitted on trips.
14. National Parks do not allow domestic animals. Domestic animals are not allowed on trips.
15. The **use of UHF radios is primarily for communication** between the trip leader and participants.
16. All participants shall abide by the directions and instructions given by the trip leader, especially in regard to:
 - a) Safety of others
 - b) Route to be taken
 - c) Fire precautions and restrictions
 - d) Care and respect of private property
 - e) Use of potentially dangerous items eg. axes winches and snatch straps
 - f) Any other instructions issued for a particular activity
17. In winching or recovery situations, instructions will be given by the leader or a designated participant.
18. Intoxicating liquor will not be consumed by the driver and/or passenger of any vehicle during the driving portion of any trip.
